"During the last few years the Complex Care Group has been a huge source of support for myself and our family. Through their newsletter we are able to access information about disability issues which affect us all. Jan is always there on the end of the phone and has come to Waihi to support us whenever she can.

When you have a person with very high and complex needs in your family, it's difficult for others to understand how hard life can be. It helps so much to have other people you can communicate with, who are in a similar situation

The health system in NZ tends to want to categorise people with disabilities. They have to fit into a box. Sometimes there is no box to fit our sons or daughters or other members of our families. It can make receiving services of any kind extremely complicated.

It's invaluable to be able to at least communicate with others to see how they have coped. You feel far less isolated than you would if groups such as Complex Care Group didn't exist. I hope they will be well enough supported financially to be able to continue and extend this care to as many families as they can for as long as possible."
